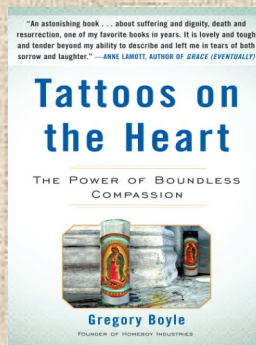
Father Gregory Boyle

Fr. Gregory Boyle – best known as Fr. Greg by all who meet him -- was born in Los Angeles, one of eight children. His father, a third-generation Irish American, worked in the family-owned dairy in Los Angeles County and his mother worked to keep track of her large family. As a youth, Fr. Greg and several of his siblings worked side by side with their father in the dairy.

He received his BA in English from Gonzaga University; an MA in English from Loyola Marymount University; a Master of Divinity from the Weston School of Theology; and a Sacred Theology Masters degree from the Jesuit School of Theology.

Homeboy Industries, founded by Father Gregory Boyle in 1986, is the largest gang intervention program in the country, offering job training, tattoo removal, and employment to members of gangs and has become a national model in its effectiveness. Homeboy offers hope to those for whom all hope is lost.

Father Greg’s first book, *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion*, was released on March 9, 2010. His book received the 2010 SCIBA (Southern California Indie Booksellers Association) Non-Fiction Book Award, and was named as one of the Best Books of 2010 by Publishers Weekly.
